PROVINCIALY SPONSORED SHOOTS:

Indoor Target Provincials:

Held the last weekend in March or first weekend in April. The Provincials usually attract anywhere from 80 – 140 shooters. Four scores of 300 are shot for a total out of 1200. Our ATAA annual general meeting is also held on the Saturday night of this event.

Indoor 3D Provincials:

Held generally in early March. Minimum requirements are 2 courses of 20 animals per day. The shoot is held over 2 days, with the winners announced at the end. FCA 3D rules are followed. Generally anywhere from 120 – 150 shooters have participated in this event.

Outdoor Target Provincials:

Held in July or August, depending on the date of the Canadian National Target Championships. The competition consists of a FITA 1440 round shot on the first day and a field round on the second. Medals are awarded for each event. FITA rules are applied.

Outdoor 3D Provincials:

Held in July or August. Minimum requirements are 3 courses of 20 targets. FCA rules are followed.

WE SUPPORT OUR HIGH ACHIEVERS

The ATAA supports the Archers who achieve such an advanced level of competency by refunding part of their travel cost. Archers willing to travel outside the country are encouraged to apply for the funding available to them. We are proud of past participants in international events and salute the efforts.

FAIR AND EQUITABLE FUNDING FOR ALL ARCHERS:

Through volunteers from our membership, the ATAA is able to work a casino event annually, allowing us to raise funds to promote our sport.

A percentage of the money raised is set aside every year to be divided up among our Junior and Adult shooters as well as Coach and Judge development programs, Provincially, Nationally and Internationally.

The funding for Junior and Adult Archers will cover from January 1st to October 31st of that year. A record of all shoots and scorecards are to be submitted to the ATAA executive before November 30th of the current year.

THE FCA AND THE ALBERTA TARGET ARCHERS ASSOCIATION:

FCA = The Federation of Canadian Archers

FCA is a not-for-profit organization of archers, managed by archers, for the benefit of archery.

FCA is a vehicle for developing archery in Canada in conjunction with the provinces through their representatives, and to help our archers' performances in international events.

It's the official representative for archery to the federal government, national and international sport organizations.

WHAT DOES THE FCA DO FOR YOU:

FCA provides up-to-date information and communication ties free of charge.

FCA promotes safety by establishing minimum standards and recommended procedures for archery.

FCA registers competitions & recognizes their results, maintains Canadian record scores for equipment types and distances, selects Canadian Archers to represent Canada in international events, including the Olympic, Pan American and Commonwealth Games.
